

DIRECTOR'S STATEMENT

As a creator of both independent films and branded videos for progressive candidates and causes, my work straddles the intersections between journalism and activism, storytelling and propaganda, art and action. I first met Ady in the role of a commercial director, when I was connected to him to direct a short launch film for the newly-formed Be a Hero campaign. I flew to Santa Barbara for what I expected to be a somber shoot: an ailing father pleading with politicians to protect his health care. But immediately upon interviewing him, I realized that what he was doing was much more profound: reframing the tragic narrative of his disease into a political platform. With self-awareness and strategic planning, he was crafting the story of his illness into a movement that catalyzed other people into action and empowered them to follow his footsteps in confronting politicians with their own stories as a rallying cry.

Ady was already losing his voice, and there was no time to waste. On the first day of filming, I pitched him on a feature documentary that would follow his fight across the intersectional issues of health care justice, disability, and electoral activism. But at its most universal level, it would be about the power of personal storytelling to transform despair into hope – something I'd always believed in but that Ady was proving true in a way I'd never witnessed before. I was driven as a filmmaker to explore the question of how sharing one's pain in the public sphere can be a healing act, for the individual and for our society. This theme is reflected not only through Ady's journey, but also the other activists in the film, including Ana Maria Archila, who uses her story of sexual assault as a tool to speak truth to power.

The intimacy, humor, and access to the most private parts of Ady's family life—reckoning with the disease and their relationship as a family—are all embedded in Ady's message in the film that the personal is inherently political. But even though Ady was willing to "exploit his disease for political gain" (as Liz acknowledges in the film), I needed to ensure that the film never exploited him or his family. Documenting an illness carries ethical questions, for example, when is it OK to film when your protagonist has lost the ability to say no? To navigate these types of issues, we came up with a system to communicate consent for filming, and created a review process over the scripting that ensured journalistic integrity while allowing Ady to retain agency over his voice and body in the film.

Ady and I are around the same age with similar backgrounds: activists from secular Jewish families on New York's Upper West Side. I knew that Ady's diagnosis could have just as easily happened to me, but that Ady—with astonishing resilience—was turning this otherwise meaningless tragedy into something incredibly powerful and transformative for the country. How would I answer being dealt such a hand? The film is my attempt at answering that question. As Ady loses his privilege, and fights for social change as a marginalized person with a disability, he taught me there are no excuses for inaction, a lesson I first learned from my blind grandfather who championed the rights of the disabled in India. Because I do not identify as having a disability, we consulted with activists/academics and filmmakers from the disability community to ensure that the representation in the film was authentic and inclusive. I hope that those communities, and all of the activists using their stories as a weapon to fight for a better world, feel seen in Ady's story on screen.

He previously directed the feature documentary *La Americana*, which won numerous festival awards and broadcast worldwide on Nat Geo and PBS. Nicholas is the founder of People's Television, a NY-based film and commercial production company. Through People's TV, he directs branded content for clients including Facebook, Airbnb, and Greenpeace.

Amanda is an award-winning documentary filmmaker with People's Television, where she has led projects as a director, producer, and writer for high profile clients such as the Democratic National Convention, Elizabeth Warren's presidential Campaign, Equal Justice Works, The Nature Conservancy, and The Equity Fund. Recently, she directed and produced a two-minute primetime television spot that appeared during the 2020 Democratic National Convention. Her work has been supported by the International Documentary Association, Rooftop Films, Film Independent, IFP, and HBO.

KENT BASSETT, EDITOR

Kent Bassett is an Emmy-nominated editor and filmmaker. He recently edited the feature documentary Standing Up, about three unlikely aspiring comedians, which premiered at DOC NYC and will be distributed by Gravitas Ventures. He also cut the feature documentary Personal Statement, about youth leaders fighting to expand college access, which premiered at AFI Docs and broadcast on PBS America ReFramed.

In TV, Kent worked as an editor on shows including Top Chef and The Real L-Word. He directed and edited the forthcoming documentary, This Might Hurt, about chronic pain and the mind-body connection.

JAY DUPLASS, EXECUTIVE PRODUCER

Jay Duplass was first recognized in the early 2000's for writing, directing and producing several award winning independent and studio films with his brother Mark, such as The Puffy Chair, Cyrus, and Jeff, Who Lives at Home. In 2014, Jay and Mark created the critically acclaimed television series Togetherness, eventually inking a television deal with HBO where they've since produced Animals and Room 104. The brothers also have an ongoing multi-film deal with Netflix for their film production. Jay began acting in 2012, when Jill Soloway cast him as series regular Josh Pfefferman in her Amazon show Transparent. He also appears regularly in Hulu's The Mindy Project, TBS' Search Party and in films such as Beatriz At Dinner, Landline, Outside In, Prospect, The Pink Wall and Horse Girl.

MARK DUPLASS, EXECUTIVE PRODUCER

Mark Duplass is an award-winning actor, filmmaker and producer. He has written, directed and produced several acclaimed independent and studio films with his brother Jay, such as The Puffy Chair, Cyrus, and Jeff, Who Lives at Home. In 2014, Mark and Jay created the critically acclaimed television series Togetherness for HBO in which Mark also starred. They also released the docuseries sensation Wild Wild Country on Netflix in 2018, for which they won an Emmy. In the start of 2020, the Duplass Brothers signed a first-look deal with HBO for whom they are currently producing the anthological series Room 104. He most recently produced and starred in the Netflix original film Paddleton with Ray Romano, as well as starred alongside Jennifer Aniston and Reese Witherspoon in Apple's The Morning Show.

BRADLEY WHITFORD, EXECUTIVE PRODUCER

Bradley Whitford is an Emmy Award-winning actor and political activist known best for his role as White House Deputy Chief of Staff Josh Lyman in *The West Wing*. He has dedicated his activism to speaking out publicly against

big business politics, notably at a protest against Scott Walker's budget repair bill in 2011. In 2007, Bradley was honored as a Champion of Justice by the Alliance for Justice, a progressive judicial advocacy organization. He now serves on the Board of Advisors for Let America Vote, a nonprofit working to end voter suppression across the country.
