Director's note

ON THE MOUNTAIN is a slice of life into one of the many agonizing choices refugees have had to make when escaping danger. As a Pakistani-Dutch woman, I was raised between two cultures, therefore stories that span the gray areas of patriarchy and identity have always intrigued me. I was living in Washington DC when the U.S. Army withdrew from Afghanistan in August 2021. Despite being in the capital of the United States, stories of devastation and unfulfilled promises barely made headlines. My best friend was working as a Pashto interpreter at a military base, and would tell me of the heart wrenching choices families had to make as they fled Afghanistan.

Raised in Pakistan, I remember all too well the day the planes hit the twin towers in New York, and the two decades of devastation that followed in Afghanistan and its borders. Millions of Afghan refugees escaped war and poverty, leaving all they had ever known, in an attempt to survive. As a result, now nearly 8.2 million Afghans live in 103 countries around the world.

Spurred by decades of untold stories of Afghan heroes, I wrote this screenplay in consultation with multiple case workers supporting the 125,000 (and counting) Afghan refugees resettling in the U.S. Our protagonist was inspired by the 14th C. Afghan poet, Rabia Balkhi, a hero - who defied power and injustice, and a martyr - who gave her life to divine love.

With nearly an all Afghan cast, and crew with personal relationship with resettlement, we have worked hard to make every aspect of this film authentic, and believe it is now in a position to be shared globally and spark a conversation on compassion in times of incomprehensible refugee crises.

We hope this film will spark dialogue, awareness and help mobilize resources for the many Afghans whose lives are starting from scratch. For Afghan women in particular, the culture shock can be immense, and so welcoming refugees with compassion, curiosity and support about their journey, can make all the difference in how they land in a new country, and the choices they make moving forward.










UNHCR estimates more than **1.6 million Afghans** have fled the country since the Taliban takeover in 2021.

In 2023, there were at least 8.2 million Afghans hosted across 103 different countries - one of the largest protracted refugee situations in the world.

Conservatively, **over 38 million people** have been displaced by conflicts in Afghanistan, Iraq, Pakistan, Yemen, Somalia, the Philippines, Libya, and Syria since September 11, 2001.

Any number is limited in what it can convey about displacement's damage. The people behind the numbers can be difficult to see, and numbers cannot communicate how it feels to lose one's home, belongings, community, and much more. Displacement has caused incalculable harm to individuals, families, towns, cities, regions, and entire countries physically, socially, emotionally, and economically.







Since starting our global festival tour, ON THE MOUNTAIN has travelled from DC to Chicago, opened 8 cities in Lebanon, followed by Albania, London, and heading back to North America in August, where we have been nominated for Best Short Film! We also have screenings lined up with non-profits working on refugee related matters, including a nationl screening tour with the support of our award-winning impact partner, <u>Picture Motion</u> and Taleem Project.

Building on the knowledge that local communities help new refugees thrive, our marketing strategy will consist of select film festival screenings and non-profit, community and academic activations, utilizing the strong partnerships we have with grassroots organizations supporting refugees.

We will also provide a toolkit which will allow for the audience to learn more and take action by connecting with legislators about the Afghan Adjustment Act, as well as steps on how to support their local refugee communities. For Afghan women in particular, the culture shock can be immense, and so welcoming refugees with compassion, curiosity and support about their journey, can make all the difference in how they land in a new country, and the choices they make moving forward.

How We Told This Story

This film was made by a diverse and vibrant cast and crew from around the world. Many have personal relationship and interest in immigration, refugees and resettlement, and have infused their passion into this film every step of the way.

It started with our selfless story consultants, Gulmina and Ann, who were working at military bases in the US where Afghan refugees were hosted temporarily as they arrived from Kabul. It was an emotional, hectic time, right after the Taliban takeover, and an abrupt end of a twenty year war. As interpreters and case workers, they absorbed the choices and emotions of the people they were supporting. Hearing their stories spurred me to write ON THE MOUNTAIN.

Early in development, Aisha & Wagma from American University's Afghan Student Association, joined as Associate Producers. Our translator Habib, who came as a refugee to the U.S. in Oct. '21, worked diligently to create authentic Dari dialogue with Kabul colloquialism. His children, ages 6 and 4, drew drawings for the case room scene, inspired by their journey as refugees escaping Kandahar. When location scouting, the Azimis offered their home in DMV as set for our Kabul scenes. Our sound mixer, Steve, served in Afghanistan for several tours. Our DP Fernando, is currently working on a feature about coyotes along the US Southern border.

Our cast consisted of six incredibly talented actors, four of whom are Afghan-American and have their own refugee journeys to the US. Our lead actor Awesta, who plays Rabia, continues to tell Afghan stories on screen and on stage, and is currently the lead for the national show, the 'Kiterunner'. Our lead actor Sayed, had worked as a translator with the US military in Kabul, and now works as an Assistant Professor in Texas.

In post-production, we were joined by Executive Producer Baktash Ahadi, who recently won three Emmys with his documentary Retrograde, about the US withdrawal from Afghanistan. One of our editors Ahmad, is a refugee from Palestine, and worked carefully to structure the story based on his intimate experience as a child.

We have worked hard to make every aspect of this film authentic, and believe it is now in a position to be shared globally and spark a conversation on compassion in times of incomprehensible refugee crises.

Anya Raza

Anya Raza is a Pakistani-Dutch writer, filmmaker and economist. Moved by the human spirit, Anya works at the nexus of art and justice, and has over a decade of experience telling stories, distilling complex messages and finding commonality in grey areas. Her thought-provoking, poetic and sometimes humorous stories aim to break stereotypes, encourage critical thinking and catalyze change. Anya believes deeply in building community.

Her stories have a focus on quieter voices, supporting social justice themes of freedom of expression, economic empowerment, equal rights and humanitarian causes, amongst others. Her debut documentary on dance and activism in Pakistan, <u>How She Moves</u> (2020), toured 26 film festivals globally, and won seven 'Best Documentary' awards.

Her last film <u>Still Here</u> (2022), advocated for support for survivors of torture globally, and received critical acclaim from human rights experts. Anya's films Asma and Stars are in post-production. She is a proud member of Brown Girl Doc Mafia, Video Consortium & stand-up comedy troupe Auratnaak.

Anya has an MA in Film & Media Production from American University and an MSc in Economics from the University of Amsterdam.




Director/ Producer / Writer

He continues to produce across multiple creative disciplines while seeking and supporting alternative models of creative practice that prioritize the artist, people and the planet's well-being.

Baktash is currently at work directing a film about combat veterans, mental health, and equine therapy. He also supports other filmmakers from concept to impact campaign as an executive producer and impact producer.

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
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
