

## **SYNOPSIS**



Dao, a small and agile jockey boy, has been competing in horse racing since he was five. With the money he earns from completing the races, Dao supports his family's livelihood. When his baby brother Fatih is born, Dao's parents face financial difficulties and send him to live with a horse owner. Dao leaves home to work and go to school at the horse owner's house. At night, Dao studies in a dark corner of the stable under dim lights. He dreams of becoming a veterinarian.

On the day of a training race, Dao is terrified when he sees a fellow rider fall from a spooked horse. His father takes him to a shaman who sprinkles him with holy water, says a prayer, and assures him that he will not be hurt even if he falls off the horse. Dao wants to believe those words, but hearing adults say that Fatih will also be raised as a jockey weighs heavily on his mind. With anxiety and hope, the boy stands in front of the starting line. How long will this race continue?

### Dao

He became a jockey at the age of 5 and retired at 13. He dreams of becoming a veterinarian and dedicates himself to his studies. However, when his brother Fatih is born, the family's finances deteriorate, so he moves into a horse owner to help and attend school.

### Hermansyah

Dao's father.

Born into poverty, he was a jockey in his youth. He barely makes ends meet by farming and caring for horses of a horse owner. Although he has no money, he decides to send Dao to the horse owner's house to continue his education.

### Handika

Dao's stablemate and retired jockey. Dao meets Handika when he comes to live in her house. He is the only one who has a realistic view of the society, which is dominated by tradition and shamanism. He supports Dao's dreams so that Dao can continue his studies and not drop out like he did.

### **Fatih**

Dao's younger brother

The birth of Fatih marks a turning point in Dao's life.

In the spring of 2017, I met Dao at a horse racing track in Bima, where he was a 12-year-old boy who said he wanted to be a veterinarian. As the son of a poor farmer, Dao believed that if he worked hard, rode horses, and studied hard, he could achieve his dream. But it wasn't easy for the boy to realize his dream.

I had watched Dao's life for six years, and that was just one piece of his life's race. There is a much longer race ahead of him, and we can't wait to see what kind of outcome he will make.
